Inauguration of Place de Vimy

In order to highlight the heroism of Canadian soldiers who fought in the Battle of Vimy Ridge in 1917, a commemorative space was inagurated in their honour at parc Notre-Dame-de-Grâce on April 9, in presence of Montreal Mayor Denis Coderre, Brigadier-General Hercule Gosselin, Commander of the 2nd Canadian Division and Joint Task Force East and CDN-NDG Borough, Mayor Russell Copeman, as well as many other dignitaries.

To call attention to the historic ties between Montréal and Vimy Ridge, six bronze plaques were erected at the site. As well as recall the bravery of Canadian soldiers, this new space is meant to serve as a place of relaxation and quiet contemplation for users of the park.

To round out the historical experience offered by Place de Vimy, passersby will be able to listen to a podcast of the famous poem *In Flanders Fields* on-site.



By-law amending the By-law Concerning Fences and Hedges Planted on Private Property

Côte-des-Neiges-Notre-Dame-de-Grâce Borough Council amended the By-law (R.R.V.M., c.C-5) concerning fences and hedges on February 13, 2017. The new by-law includes provisions aimed at ensuring the safety of pedestrians and motorists.

The new standards for fencing and hedges on private property are as follows:

- Fences in side yards or backyards on a property may measure up to 2.70 m. Above a height of two metres, 25% of the fence must have an openwork design;
- The maximum fence or hedge height in the front yard of a property and in the sight triangle (i.e., a corner property at an intersection) remains the same, at 0.90 m;
- There is no height limit for hedges in side yards or backyards.



Road Repairs



Record **Investment in Road Repairs**

Close to 24 km of roads were paved in 2016, and this year an additional 30 km of roads will be repaired.

Road repair work starts on June 1 and continues until the fall of 2017.

Levelling, adjustment and paving operations will be carried out on 174 road sections spanning a total area of close to 30 km.

Close to \$35 million will be invested in road repairs through the Three-Year Capital Works Program (CWP) 2016-2017-2018, the Programme complémentaire de planagerevêtement (PCPR) 2017 and various other municipal programs.

The road repairs are intended to:

- Ensure the safety of pedestrians, cyclists and motorists using the borough's road network;
- Extend the lifespan of road infrastructures;
- · Comply with the environmental standards in force.

The table below indicates the road sections targeted this year under the Road Repair Program (RRP), with the work operations carried out in large part by the borough. Some of these work operations will be led by municipal administration. In the event of unfavourable weather conditions, among other things, work operations on some streets may be postponed until 2018.

Citizens on local roads earmarked for repair will be informed in writing of the nature and duration of the work operations so that they can arrange their transportation accordingly.

Continued Development of the Corridor Darlington

Discover the Corridor Darlington, the new eco-trail connecting Mount Royal and the main Université de Montréal campus with its new Outremont campus. This trail - a finalist for the 2016 David Suzuki Action Prize - was created to ease travel between the two campuses, but also to facilitate the movement of local animal species and ensure their long-term survival.


Starting this summer, identification signs will allow citizens to better recognize the elements forming an integral part of this project, which was first set in motion in 2014.

Development of a garden for pollinators

A garden featuring nectariferous plants will be created this summer on the eastern slope of the Châteaufort community garden. Bees will be drawn to this green space to gorge on pollen so that they can then pollinate the community garden and thus optimize its agricultural yield.

Louis-Collin pedestrian space

A portion of rue Louis-Collin between rue Édouard-Montpetit and the cul-de-sac will be transformed into a pedestrian space for the summer. This project will secure the sector for the more than 3,000 pedestrians who use it daily. Automobile traffic will be maintained at all times.

help protect the wooded area bordering avenue Wilderton. Indigenous plant species will also be grown to increase biodiversity. Site fencing is currently installed around parc Marie-Gérin-Lajoie, and its reopening is scheduled for the end of July. Once citizens can access the paths, cyclists will be obliged to stop and walk their bicycles through the newly developed park to ensure its long-term sustainability and protect the surrounding flora.

Free Distribution of Flowers, Compost and Wood Chips

The Côte-des-Neiges-Notre-Dame-de-Grâce Borough will offer free cosmos and blanket flowers to residents on Saturday, May 27, 2017 starting at 9 a.m. A maximum of 24 flowers and 25 litres of compost and wood chips will be offered per household, until stocks run out. Proof of

residence will be required. Bring your own bags, containers or a wheelbarrow to transport flower flats, wood chips and compost. Given that this distribution is meant to beautify the environment, the flowers must be planted outdoors for optimal visibility.

The Borough and You

A Bustling Library Network



The Côte-des-Neiges-Notre-Dame-de-Grâce borough's network of libraries is among the busiest in the entire city.

This year, a considerable increase in book loans, subscribers and usage at all four libraries in CDN-NDG exerted a strong impact on statistics across the entire Montreal network.

The libraries of the borough

- Benny Library (6400 avenue de Monkland);
- Côte-des-Neiges Library (5290 chemin de la Côte-des-Neiges);
- CDN Intercultural Library (6767 chemin de la Côte-des-Neiges);
- Notre-Dame-de-Grâce Library (3755 rue Botrel).

The CDN-NDG Borough contributed in a proportion of 127% to the total spike in usage of the Montréal library network, which recorded an 83% increase in loans and a 48% increase in new subscribers.

Benny Library

Since it reopened in 2016, the Benny Library has been an unprecedented success. Its usage rate rose from 84,516 to 407,293 visitors after its redevelopment.

Subscribers now have access to a large, open-concept, brightly lit and comfortable space, not to mention a larger collection of documents.

The new Benny Library also features a co-creation space called Benny Fab, which allows users to get acquainted with robotics, electricity, video games and 3D printing. The Fab Lab is the first such space to open in Montreal.

375th Anniversary Festivities in CDN-NDG

375th anniversary legacy project in CDN-NDG

An urban legacy project marking the anniversary year will be bequeathed to residents of the borough, with parc Kent and parc Notre-Dame-de-Grâce both receiving a public square that will be accessible at the end of June. Each of these parks is located in one of the borough's founding neighbourhoods, and each boasts a rich cultural, linguistic and historic heritage.

The project designers drew from creative ideas submitted by students at the Université de Montréal and Concordia University. The CDN-NDG legacy project will be inaugurated successively in the two parks on June 28, with the presentation of the show *La Fanfarniente della Strada* (parc de Kent at 4:30 p.m.) and a performance by Gypsy Kumbia Orchestra (parc NDG at 5:30 p.m.). Kids activities will include balloons and makeup. Bring your picnic and join the festive and family-friendly celebrations!

The Borough and You

Dealing with Unsanitary Housing: The Role of Inspectors

Côte-des-Neiges-Notre-Dame-de-Grâce borough inspectors have a mandate to enforce the *By-law concerning the sanitation, maintenance and safety of dwelling units.*

Factors likely to adversely affect a person's quality of life include bed bugs, mould and water infiltration.

CDN-NDG sanitation inspectors were very busy in 2016, with close to 4,000 inspections carried out in dwelling units across borough territory.

Unfortunately, inspectors are often required to return to the same places on several occasions. As a consequence, hundreds of statements of offence and inspection were issued last year.

Opération salubrité arrondissement (OSA), implemented in CDN-NDG in 2013, involves systematic inspections of dwelling units and rigorous follow-up on problematic cases.

In 2016, some 102 buildings were targeted under OSA. Following preliminary inspections, 37 buildings with more than 20 dwelling units came under the borough's radar.

Submitted to detailed inspections at every level (i.e., dwelling units, common spaces in buildings, façades, walls, general state of the building, etc.), owners were obliged to correct the numerous shortcomings listed, sometimes in the hundreds. These owners have every interest in collaborating with inspectors, at the risk of being ordered to pay substantial fines.

Did you know that?

When an unsanitary dwelling unit is reported, the statement includes a recommendation to advise the owner of the undesirable situation. Tenants, owners or any person intent on helping a friend or family member dealing with a sanitation issue can then contact the borough by calling 311.

Exercise your rights!

Only 55% of requests recorded in 2016 in connection with an unsanitary dwelling were reported by a citizen. The remaining cases were reported by municipal inspectors who were the first to observe the lamentable conditions in a dwelling unit.

Verbally inform the landlord about the problem if he can be reached. If the landlord still falls to act, advise him in writing, preferably by registered mail, giving him a deadline (usually 10 days if it is not urgent) to act. Be sure to obtain and keep the proof of receipt. An inspector from the Borough then takes charge of your file. He may demand that the landlord act within a prescribed deadline, subject to a fine. The applicant will be informed of developments regarding his file.
