Has sharing public spaces become a problem?

Have you been feeling less safe in recent months?

We have heard your concerns and taken measures to improve the situation.

Since the start of the health crisis triggered by the COVID-19 pandemic, you have surely noticed an increase in the number of homeless people in the district, particularly around the Guy-Favreau Complex.

A shelter to help the most vulnerable people

Homeless aboriginal people are being hit the hardest during this crisis. This is why Projets autochtones du Québec (PAQ) decided to open a temporary shelter this fall.

Guy-Favreau Complex is being used to meet these emergency housing needs. This **48-bed shelter, open evenings and nights 7 days a week**, is essential. It aims to offer the most vulnerable people a safe place to eat, rest and use sanitary facilities.

Actions to favour cohabitation

Ville Marie, in cooperation with the Centre de coordination des mesures d'urgence de Montréal, the Service de la diversité et de l'inclusion sociale de la Ville de Montréal, PAQ (Projets autochtones du Québec) and the Société de développement social, has put in place various measures to minimize nuisances and rude behaviour associated with the shelter:

- Garbage is now collected daily;
- Additional resources are now constantly cleaning the Guy-Favreau Complex surroundings plus neighbouring streets and parks;
- Garbage cans and two chemical toilets have been added;
- Syringe collection bins have been installed;
- O The number of **front-line workers** has been increased;
- O Police officers from PDQ 21 regularly patrol the area.

Projets autochtones du Québec (PAQ), is more than just a physical space: it is a community that supports aboriginal people in Montréal who are homeless and at risk. The indigenous women and men who use the PAQ shelters are our fellow citizens, our neighbours. Many aboriginal people arrive in Montréal with nowhere to stay. PAQ is an important landmark for them. All this community wants is a warm bed and a place to eat supper.

PAQ offers these people, who have suffered profound trauma, stigmatization and exclusion, a place in the city where they will be understood and treated with the respect and dignity they deserve. PAQ supports its First Nations, Inuit and Métis clients by giving them a chance to thrive, express their individuality, celebrate their culture and realize their full potential.
