Accepted materials


- ► Refrigerators, freezers and air conditioners containing halocarbons (coolant gases);
- Appliances:
- Information and communications technology products (computers, printers, sound systems, televisions, DVD or VHS players, etc.);
- Reusable items:
- Bulky upholstered items (sofas, armchairs, mattresses, etc.);
- Paper, cardboard, glass, plastic and metal containers:
- Ferrous and non-ferrous metal items:
- Bicycle tires, inner tubes and worn-out car tires measuring 84 cm or less;
- Construction, renovation and demolition waste (wood, gyproc, asphalt shingles, aggregate less than 45 cm in diameter consisting of brick, mortar, stone, asphalt or concrete, uncontaminated soils, etc.);
- Household hazardous waste (HHW) (paint, oil, solvent, pesticide, bleach, etc.);
- Green waste and branches. Rules change depending on the season, consult the écocentre website for the current rules.



Before you throw it away - can it be reused?

Reuse centres

Residents wishing to dispose of items that are still in good condition can drop them off at a reuse centre. These donations will be given to organizations or companies working in the reuse



Residents can go to the reuse centre at the LaSalle écocentre to buy recycled construction materials (doors and windows, bathtubs, sinks, tiles, etc.).

Écocentres are sorting centres for Montréal Island residents, where they can drop off items for recovery. Reuse, recycling, composting and other appropriate forms of recovery make it possible to considerably reduce the amount of waste that ends up in landfills.

Proper sorting means better recycling!

Why is it important to sort your materials before arriving at the écocentre?

It makes your visit to the écocentre simpler and faster.

Sorted materials are worth more: they can be passed along to specialized recyclers.


It helps the agglomeration and its residents to reduce considerably landfill costs.

70% of the items brought to écocentres would otherwise end up in landfills.

Access and rates

Agglomeration residents

- All Montréal Island residents have access to the écocentres.
- ► They must come in person, with proof of residency (tax or utility bills, etc.) **AND** photo ID.
- ▶ Drop-offs are free up to 12 m³ per year for construction materials (extra to be charge as of 25\$/m³).
- Maximum of 15 visits per year for construction materials, except at the LaSalle écocentre, where there is no limit on the number of visits allowed.

Contractors and self-employed construction workers

working for an agglomeration resident and with their place of business on Montréal Island (proof required)

- Rates:
 - Construction material: \$25/m³
 - Metal: free of charge
- Hazardous household products refused
- Maximum of 15 visits per year, except at the LaSalle écocentre, where there is no limit on the number of visits allowed
