## Ancillary constructions and equipment

## Fences

In order to promote harmony in exterior appearance, the Borough of Saint-Laurent has adopted regulations to guide the construction of certain structures that are accessory to a residential building.

No permit or authorization certificate is required for the installation or the construction of a fence ${ }^{1}$.
Fences can be erected in any yard of a private lot, provided that all requirements are respected.

## General provisions

- The minimum distance between a fence and a fire hydrant is 1.20 m .
- The minimum distance between a fence and a sidewalk or a street edge is 1.50 m .
- Fences must be maintained and kept in good condition.
- At intersections, a visibility triangle ${ }^{2}$ providing clear views of streets and alleys must be respected.


## Authorized materials

Only the following materials are authorized:

- Fabricated metal
- Iron mesh
- Manufactured, enamelled or corrugated panels
- Planed, treated, painted, varnished or stained wood, with posts spaced no more than 3 m apart in order to provide solidity
- Polymer (plastic)


## Provisions applicable to the Bois-Franc and Nouveau Saint-Laurent sectors

- Fences located in a side or a back yard:
- Iron mesh, plastic-coated, with metal posts and rails
- Iron mesh, with metal posts and rails, and aluminum or polyvinyl chloride (PVC) slats
- Polyvinyl chloride (PVC)
- Ornamental iron or wrought iron
- Masonry posts, except for PVC fencing
- Fences located in a front yard:
- Wrought iron or ornamental iron
- Masonry posts for wrought iron or ornamental iron


## Materials not permitted for fences

- Barbed wire
- Chain-link
- Sheet metal, unless corrugated or enamelled

Wood is not allowed for fencing in the Bois-Franc and Nouveau Saint-Laurent sectors.

Installation standards
Fences can only be installed on private lots.
Installation of a fence is mandatory in the following situations:

- The installation of a private swimming pool (for additional information, see the infosheets related to in-ground pools, above-ground pools, and hot tubs and spas).
- A property or excavation presenting a danger to public safety.

IMPORTANT: Depending on their nature and magnitude, certain construction projects may require obtaining a permit to occupy the public domain, particularly due to the installation of a container, a debris chute or the presence of materials on public roads. For more information, consult the information sheet, "Regulation: Occupation of the public domain".

## Definitions

${ }^{1}$ Fence: Any construction, whether or not along a property line, other than a high or low wall, installed in order to delimit or close off a space.
${ }^{2}$ Visibility triangle: On a property located at the intersection of 2 or more streets, a visibility triangle extending 10 m along each street must be maintained. This triangle is measured from the intersection of the 2 paving lines or from their extension.
