And the winner is: a team comprised of 4 firms: Table Architecture, LAND Italia, civiliti and Biodiversité Conseil.

TOUR OF METRO CAR GARAGE WORKSITE


On June 1, several Saint-Laurent officials and members of Borough administration visited the sprawling Garage Côte-Vertu work site located at the intersection of Marcel-Laurin and Thimens boulevards, just steps from the Centre des loisirs. The construction of this underground garage complex will make it possible to accommodate ten additional metro cars starting in early 2021.

"My colleagues and I were very impressed by the scope and complexity of the site! The explanations by the STM experts who hosted us allowed us to better understand the issues involved in this tremendous project.

Metro users who live or work in Saint-Laurent will benefit tremendously from the improved service on the orange line", the Mayor, Alan DeSousa, explained.

GAME OVER FOR OLD WOOD HEATING APPLIANCES!

Effective October 1, 2018, the use of wood stoves. furnaces, boilers and other polluting heating devices that do not comply with the bylaws will be prohibited in each of Ville de Montréal's 19 boroughs.

The bylaw applies to solid fuel burning appliances that are deemed to cause too much pollution. The bylaw also covers stoves and woodstoves designed to burn wood logs, ecological logs, pellets or coal, that emit more than 2.5 grams of fine particles every hour.

One exception: In the event of a power outage lasting longer than three hours, these "retired" stoves and fireplaces may be used (if they are in good working order).

What are the options?

Only wood heating devices with EPS or CSA certification indicating that they do not release more than 2.5 grams/hour of fine particles may be used.

If you replace your woodstove or fireplace with a certified model, you must declare this by completing the online form. This also applies if you decide to remove your wood heating device. Replacements are available that burn natural gas, propane or ethanol, and that run on electricity.

Penalties

The Ville de Montréal bylaw prescribes a fine ranging from \$100 to \$500 for a citizen's first offence. The fine can range from \$1000 for second offence up to \$2000 for subsequent violations.

PREVENTIVE CHIMNEY SWEEPING

Saint-Laurent wishes to remind its citizens that the municipal bylaw on fire prevention stipulates that all chimneys, with the exception of those connected to gas heating systems, must be swept at least once a year.

Citizens may call the company of their choice or contact the trusted firm mandated by the Borough. For 2018, Saint-Laurent has mandated Le meilleur Ramoneur to carry out preventive chimney sweeping services on its territory. Priced at \$23.50 plus taxes, this chimney-sweeping operation is a basic service and does not include the maintenance of furnaces and the cleaning of horizontal ducts, which, under certain circumstances, must be insured by the owner. The price may vary depending on the chimney type and size.

A SECOND BICYCLE REPAIR STATION, COMPLIMENTS OF THE SAINT-LAURENT LIONS CLUB

Saint-Laurent Council inaugurated its second *biciborne* (bicycle repair station) on its territory, on May 23. The first one, in Parc Painter, was installed in 2016. Located in front of Aréna Raymond-Bourque, adjacent to the bicycle path, this self-service bicycle repair station provides cyclists with tools to make repairs quickly

and free of charge. This biciborne is a legacy of the Saint-Laurent Lions Club, offered within the scope of the 100th anniversary of the Lions Club International (2017), Montréal's 375th anniversary (2017) and Saint-Laurent's 125th (2018).

PARC MARCEL-LAURIN **WOODLAND HOSTS ENVIRONMENTAL ACTIVITIES**

As it does every year, Saint-Laurent joined forces with VertCité this spring to organize two events related to sustainable development in Parc Marcel-Laurin woodland, one of the few natural environments on Saint-Laurent territory.

The woodland clean-up and enhancement operation was held on April 20 as part of Earth Day. The efforts of the 75 elementary school students, accompanied by teachers, parents and residents volunteering their time and energy, as well as Saint-Laurent's municipal employees, proved successful: a total of 972 litres of garbage, 48 litres of organic waste and 810 litres of recyclable materials were collected! This conservation operation was carried out through a partnership with the Comité écologique du Grand Montréal. As for the TD Friends of the Environment Foundation, it is a Gold Partner in the conservation of the woodland, with a cumulative donation of nearly \$40,000.

One month later, on May 26, more than 250 people took part in Biodiversity Day. Some ten kiosks manned by the Borough and its partners presented various initiatives designed to protect biodiversity. There was a particularly large number of children joining the Biodiversity Rally, with its many educational activities for the whole family. Parc Marcel-Laurin woodland is definitely home to many friends of all ages!

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR THE PURCHASE OF **ECO-FRIENDLY LAWN MOWERS**

In order to contribute to the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions, Saint-Laurent has launched a financial assistance program, in collaboration with the VertCité organization, to encourage residents to use zero-fuel lawn mowers. As part of this project, approximately 40 rebates of \$75, covering up to 50% of the purchase price of a manual or electric lawn mower (whether corded or battery-powered), will be paid out to Saint-Laurent residents every year, for three years. It can be a new or second-hand lawn mower, thereby encouraging re-use.

REMINDER

Materials accepted in the brown bin

Food waste (raw, cooked or spoiled), paper and cardboard (including tissues and paper towels), green waste, other (eggshells, nut shells...)

Collection schedule (according to district)


- · Brown bin: once weekly
- · Green bin: once weekly
- Black bin: once every two weeks

Summer tips and tricks

Put the brown bin out for collection every week, regardless of how much it contains.



Use paper bags, cardboard or newsprint to wrap organic waste or to line the bottom of the brown bin.



Freeze meat and fish scraps and place them in the bin on collection day.



Alternate wet items (table scraps) and dry items (newsprint, dead leaves) inside the bin.



Sprinkle a little baking soda inside the bin and clean it regularly with mild detergent or white vinegar.

LE CORRIDOR DE BIODIVERSITÉ

À terme, le corridor de biodiversité couvrira un vaste territoire d'environ 450 hectares, passant par des secteurs industriels, commerciaux et résidentiels. Il s'étendra de l'intersection du boulevard Cavendish et de la voie de desserte de l'autoroute 40 au parc nature du Bois-de-Liesse, en passant par le pôle Marcel-Laurin, à l'intersection des boulevards Poirier et Cavendish.

Le corridor permettra de relier les milieux naturels aux autres espaces verts existants sur la zone concernée à Saint-Laurent. Il favorisera de plus le mouvement de la faune et la dispersion de la flore, tout en augmentant leur diversité. Enfin, il encouragera les déplacements des citoyens, qui auront ainsi accès à des espaces combinant les bienfaits d'une nature diversifiée aux attraits patrimoniaux, historiques, culturels et artistiques de l'arrondissement.

En remportant ce concours, l'équipe lauréate reçoit le mandat d'élaborer le plan directeur d'aménagement de ce corridor de biodiversité, pour lequel elle recevra des honoraires de 125 000 \$. Ce plan directeur proposera à Saint-Laurent des orientations, des stratégies d'interventions et des aménagements afin d'atteindre les objectifs du projet.

Le concours

Le concours a été organisé en collaboration avec le Bureau du design de la Ville de Montréal. Ouvert à l'échelle canadienne, il visait les architectes paysagistes, les experts en biologie ou en écologie, les designers et les architectes. C'est la première fois qu'un projet portant sur la biodiversité fait l'objet d'un concours au Québec.

THE BIODIVERSITY CORRIDOR

Once completed, the biodiversity corridor will cover a vast territory of approximately 450 hectares, including industrial, commercial and residential sectors. It will extend from the intersection of Boulevard Cavendish and Highway 40 service road to Bois-de-Liesse nature park, via the Marcel-Laurin hub, at the corner of Poirier and Cavendish.

This biodiversity corridor will make it possible to connect natural environments to the other existing green spaces within the area concerned in Saint-Laurent. It will also encourage the movement of wild life and the spread of plant life, while increasing their diversity. And lastly, it will encourage residents to discover to places that combine the benefits of diversified nature with the Borough's heritage, historical, cultural and artistic attractions.

In winning this competition, the chosen team will be awarded a \$125,000 contract to develop the master plan for this biodiversity corridor. This master plan will offer Saint-Laurent recommendations on orientations, intervention strategies and developments, in order to reach the project's goals.

The competition

The competition, organized in cooperation with Ville de Montréal's Bureau du design, was open to landscape architects, biology and ecology specialists, designers and other architects across Canada. This is the first time that a competition has been held for a biodiversity project in Québec.



By rebalancing the number of parking spaces on each side of the orange metro line, the new infrastructure will improve service frequency by 25% (reduced from 2.3 minutes to 2 minutes during peak periods) with the addition of trains during peak periods. It will also support the anticipated increase in ridership in the coming years and enhance the service supply with a view to extending the blue line.







DEUX PRIX DÉFI SANTÉ

TWO AWARDS IN THE HEALTH CHALLENGE

For its Sports Complex, Saint-Laurent has been awarded at the provincial and Montréal levels of the 2018 Défi Santé (Health Challenge) the Prix Défi Santé Municipalité accueillante, championne des environnements favorables aux saines habitudes de vie, catégorie Bonification des infrastructures et équipements sportifs, récréatifs et de loisirs (Welcoming Municipality Health Challenge Award, champion of environments conducive to healthy lifestyles in the category of Improvements to sports, recreational and leisure infrastructures and facilities), The jury highlighted the accessibility and appeal of the building which, through its presence in the Saint-Laurent ecosystem, is encouraging residents to be active.

Saint-Laurent Mayor Alan DeSousa accepted on May 17 the award in Gatineau, at the annual conference of the Union des municipalités du Québec in front of an audience of over 1,200 elected officials, managers and municipal partners. Mr. DeSousa was delighted to mention: "The construction of the Sports Complex is a direct response to the needs expressed by our residents and associations over the past several decades. Thanks to this infrastructure, Saint-Laurent is offering more varied recreational sports activities over longer hours, all through close cooperation with clubs and associations active on its territory. The Sports Complex is truly a wonderful space that also promotes the development of healthy lifestyle habits!"

CONTEXT

The Ville de Montréal Charter stipulates that at a regular Council meeting held in June, the Borough Mayor must present to the citizens the highlights of the Borough's financial report and, if applicable, those of the General Auditor's report and those of the external auditor's report if items relating to the Borough are mentioned.

This report is distributed across Saint-Laurent territory according to the distribution terms determined by the Borough.



In accordance with the law, I am hereby tabling the Saint-Laurent's *Highlights of the 2017 Financial Report*.

These highlights include the inauguration of numerous sites and services that have helped enhance the quality of the environment and services offered to our residents.

Presented to Saint-Laurent Council by the Mayor, Alan DeSousa, FCPA, FCA, on June 5, 2018.

ACHIEVEMENTS IN 2017

- Participation in Montréal's 375th Anniversary celebrations with the inauguration of Place Rodolphe-Rousseau, in August, and the hosting of several activities during the year. These included the virtual reality project entitled Saint-Laurent en 7 temps, featured free of charge at the Musée des maîtres et artisans du Québec until the end of the year.
- The opening of the Sports Complex in June and the hosting of the Fête de la rentrée sportive on August 19 to crown the facility's first full year of operation. Approximately 4000 participants visited the new facility during the event.
- The receipt of two awards for the Bibliothèque du Boisé. In May, the Royal Architectural College awarded its Green Building Award to the project's designing architect and senior partner at Lemay, Éric Pelletier. In December, the Conseil régional de l'environnement de Montréal awarded Saint-Laurent the "Stationnement écoresponsable" (Eco-friendly Parking) award.
- The creation of the Culture and Libraries publication combining these two activity programs, and the introduction of free admission for spectators aged 12 and under starting in the fall.
- The unveiling, in March, of new universally accessible facilities at Aréna Raymond-Bourque, representing a \$915,000 investment to benefit residents with limited mobility.

- The rollout, in May, of the third edition of the Rendez-vous laurentien de l'emploi (Saint-Laurent Job Fair), at the Centre des loisirs, organized in collaboration with the Comité de développement économique et d'employabilité de Saint-Laurent.
- The opening, in May, of the ABB company's new head office, valued at \$90 million.
- The addition, in the spring, of two new prizes in the Residential Landscaping category of the Maisons fleuries contest. Previously included in other sectors, from now on, Nouveau Saint-Laurent and Bois-Franc will celebrate their very own winners due to their major growth in recent years.
- The adoption, in June, of the monarch butterfly as the entomological emblem of Saint-Laurent, which was also the first Montréal borough to become "Ami du monarque".
- The simultaneous tabling, in August, of five sectorial plans to form an inspired and integrated vision of Saint-Laurent's major orientations for the future of the community. These plans relate to the development of culture, sustainable development and transportation, and the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions.
- The construction of a level crossing enabling pedestrians and cyclists to safely cross the railway between the Montpellier and Hodge-Place Benoit sectors.











- The development of three new universallyaccessible community gardens.
- Development of Parc Bois-Franc, repairs to Parc Cousineau and creation of a soccer field in Parc Philippe-Laheurte.
- The acquisition of a vacant property at the intersection of Rue Jules-Poitras and Boulevard Henri-Bourassa with a view to responding to the local service needs of citizens in the eastern sector of Saint-Laurent. At a cost of \$4.4 million, the transaction was entirely financed by the Borough.
- The unveiling of two murals on Boulevard Décarie in the Saint-Laurent cultural district. Located in front of Place Rodolphe-Rousseau, the first was created by artist Dodo Ose, and is named L'Envol. The second is an untitled work created by artist Cyndie Belhumeur.
- The securing, in September, of the Leader of Sustainable Transportation in the Continuity category at the Chamber of Commerce of Metropolitan Montreal's Business Luncheon.
 Jointly presented by Voyagez futé and MOBA – Mobilité alternative, this award underscores the outstanding efforts of companies and organizations involved in the implementation of measures to promote public and active transit.

- The inauguration, in October, of the Green Cross Biotherapeutics facilities. This worldrenown corporation joined the industrial life sciences cluster. Completed at a cost of \$400 million, these facilities are striving for LEED Silver certification.
- The launch, last fall, of the first installation phase for electric car charging stations on borough streets.
- The inauguration, in September, of outdoor facilities at the Centre des loisirs offering new leisure spaces for families and senior citizens.
- The opening, in the fall, of the FabricARThèque, a new self-serve artistic creation venue inside the Bibliothèque du Vieux-Saint-Laurent.
- The launch, in September, of a multidisciplinary landscape architecture contest for the development of a master landscaping plan for the Cavendish-Laurin-Liesse biodiversity corridor.
- The realization of the Éco-campus Hubert-Reeves project with the signing, in October, of a first land purchase agreement with FPInnovations.

2017 FINANCIAL RESULTS

Now, let's take a look at the key financial data for last year. The 2017 budget endowment comprised \$4,742,100 in income and \$67,990,900 in expenses. This corresponded to a budget envelope totalling \$50,575,400 from the City in addition to fiscal space and local taxes totalling \$11,752,100, and a surplus appropriation of \$921,300.

Thanks to meticulous management, savings on several budget items made it possible to generate an operating surplus of \$0.11 million, and this, prior to central adjustments.

The following table presents, by activity, the variances between the original amended budget and the real results for 2017.
