This fall, Ville-Marie is truly in motion!

The month of September marks a time of change: we look back on summer and embrace a new colourful season.

In Ville-Marie, fall is when we focus on mobility and safety for one and all, a priority embodied concretely in the soon to be announced **Local Transportation Plan** (p. 3), a set of measures intended to make public transportation safer and easier, by reducing its impact and encouraging new behaviours. Protrusions, designed to make intersections greener, prettier and safer, have already been set up; parklets now complement the urban furniture, and traffic calming measures have been deployed on some streets.

Habits are truly changing: as one example, the use of active transport modes has increased this summer both among the public and among borough employees, many of whom have made the switch from motor vehicles to electric bicycles.

In other encouraging news, the borough is very proud of its environment friendly achievements, including the Accès jardins program, which spawned new green spaces alongside the UQAM campus; the reunification of Médéric-Martin Park; the blossoming of new green alleys; the implementation of the “refreshing oases” program, intended to make underused institutional spaces greener; and the meticulous refurbishment of parks by our teams.

I encourage you to take advantage of the last lovely days of summer by strolling about and rediscovering the vitality of Ville-Marie, graced with ever evolving neighbourhoods and facilities. And be sure to participate in the countless free activities and events.

A plan to improve transportation

Transportation has always been a fundamental challenge, spurring communities to innovate. To meet this challenge, cities have built and extended their networks, and designed and developed modes of transport, first by harnessing the forces of nature and later by inventing combustion engines. The goal was always to get around faster. However, the model has undeniable negative side effects: congestion, pollution and fatal accidents.

To meet these contemporary challenges, Ville-Marie has designed a **Plan local de déplacements** (local transportation plan), soon to be released.

The Arrondissement de Ville-Marie is situated downtown, in the heart of the province's largest city. Given the sizable number of citizens who live in the territory, the borough must consider its residential, educational, economic, and commercial needs simultaneously, when setting its objectives and planning its actions. The local transportation plan will thus be developed within a **local and metropolitan perspective**. It will improve the quality of living environments while advancing the development and attractiveness of downtown.

It includes measures to highlight **active, collective and other transport modes**, to make streets and intersection safer. The plan aims to reduce the number of accidents, increase the sense of safety, mitigate greenhouse gas emissions and add to greenery. Large employers and institutions will be invited to help attenuate both the impact of their employees' travel and the carbon footprint they generate. Consult our upcoming newsletters or Facebook publications to find out more details about this plan, which will orient actions over the next 10 years, notably to facilitate commuter travel on the territory and reduce the impact of transportation.

Electric cargo bikes downtown

To ease congestion, greenhouse gas emissions, and noise pollution downtown, delivery trucks will shorten their routes by depositing their merchandise at a former bus station. Packages will then be distributed in two ways:

- By **electric cargo bicycles** directly to recipients;
- In **electronic lockers**. Recipients will receive a notice informing them that their package has arrived. They can then come collect it themselves on foot, or by Metro, bus or bicycle.

This pilot project intended to optimize merchandise transport rests on three pillars: sustainable development, mobility and quality of life.

The goal:

To optimize management of the last kilometre of delivery, particularly through the use of smaller, environment-friendly vehicles. Starting in September, this innovative pilot project will explore new avenues to improve mobility sustainably.

School zones more refreshing and safer

This summer the borough launched the "**refreshing oases**" program. The objective: make empty lots greener. The first oasis, which also features sidewalk protrusions, surfaced next to the Jean-Baptiste-Meilleur Elementary School, to the delight, and improved safety, of people young and old.

ENVIRONMENT

Recycling: the bins are here!

Change has come: By the end of September, the whole borough will be switching to the Montréal bin for recyclable collection. The implementation of this bin aims to encourage reduction at source by eliminating the single-use plastic bags that had previously been used for collection.

When? Between 5 and 8 a.m. on the morning of the collection **Where?** Curbside.

Keep in mind

- The Montréal bin belongs to the city: do not take it with you if you move.
- Retrieve your bin as quickly as possible after each collection to avoid blocking the public roadways.

I recycle!

Green waste collection

Fall means raking leaves and preparing gardens for winter. Here's the lowdown on green waste collection:

What is collected?

Lawn clippings, dead leaves, pumpkins cut in pieces, hedge clipping waste, waste from the garden and fruit trees, and branches of trees 1 metre long and maximum 5 cm in diameter.

When?

Wednesday, September 4 to November 27 inclusively.

Where?

Curbside, in a:

- rigid reusable container equipped with handles and no lid
- in a brown paper bag
- in a compostable bag marked Biosak or BioBag
- in a regular plastic bag

Important!

Tree trunks, stumps and branches on private property that are longer than 1 m and more than 5 cm in diameter, for all species combined, are not collected by the borough.

6 ways to reduce waste

In Québec, 13 million tons of waste are produced each year. Equal to one 25-ton truck every minute! Half the waste material generated ends up in landfills. We can all do something to help solve this problem, one gesture at a time. Here are six ideas to inspire you.

1. Recycle cigarette butts

Compost, urban furniture, industrial pallets: yes, cigarette butts are recyclable! Simply deposit them in the **Mégot Zéro** public boxes installed by the eco-quartiers, or in one of the 227 urban ashtrays in the Borough.

2. Reusable diaper subsidies

The borough is offering a **subsidy of \$180** to buy or rent washable baby diapers. A great reason to make the switch.

3. Community compost

No brown bin collection on your street? No problem! Just head to one of the **25 community composting sites** in the borough. Contact your éco-quartier for more information.

4. Can brackets

More than **200 garbage cans** in the borough are now equipped with a **bracket** that lets people collect returnable cans and bottles more easily. A fine collaboration between the solidarity cooperative Les Valoristes (bidders) and the borough to keep waste out of landfills.

5. “No circulars”

A staggering 900,000 bags of flyers are distributed each week in Montréal. If you don't want any, you can obtain a **free “No circulars” sticker** at the Accès Montréal office (800, boulevard De Maisonneuve Est, 17th floor).

6. Where does it go?

Yes, absolutely: Soiled paper towels can go into your composting bin. Need any other tips to sort like a pro? Don't know exactly how to dispose of materials you don't need any more? Just download the app *Ça va où?* It has all the information you need!

The best waste is none at all!

From October 19 to 27, 2019, stock up on ideas to reduce waste and consume differently. Discover over 300 tools and activities divided into seven themes that will encourage you to change your habits, one step at a time.

“La consigne J'accroche!” Get hooked on recycling!

Did you know that each year Québécois throw away the equivalent of \$28 million in refundable containers? It's time to join the movement *La consigne J'accroche*.

- 1 Place your returnable containers in a reusable bag.
- 2 Install a *La consigne J'accroche* hook in a clearly visible spot outside your home. You can buy one online or in person at your éco-quartier or from L'itinéraire (2101, Sainte-Catherine Est).
- 3 When the bag is full of containers, hang it from your hook on recyclable collection day.

The solidarity cooperative Les Valoristes will take care of the rest!

Instead of being thrown away with the garbage, the contents of each bag will be redeemed by one of the 2,000 *valoristes* (also known as binners) in Montréal. These people who have difficulty entering traditional job markets redeem the refundable beverage containers for cash.

A new green alley will sprout this fall in the Sainte-Marie district, between De Lorimier and Bordeaux, Sherbrooke and de Rouen.

7 questions for Keven Caron Horticulturist for the Arrondissement de Ville-Marie

Keven's passion for horticulture sprouted at a very tender age: his bedroom hosted over 40 plants, and he loved transplanting small trees from the forest into his garden.

Today he is part of the team that manages the plants in Ville-Marie. Parks, green spaces and flowerpots are his cup of tea!

How would you describe your trade?

Very diversified! You have to think about and design landscaping in parks, keep up-to-date with the latest horticultural news, coordinate teams to be ready in time for events (various setups for Formula 1, des Faubourgs Park for Montréal Pride, etc.), manage planting and plant maintenance...while being as organic as possible. This year we didn't use any pesticides!

What do you like the most about your work?

The creative side: playing with heights, colours, textures... I start from scratch, with a scrap of paper, and I create something alive...without knowing exactly how it's going to turn out! I also like to tell the public about new varieties of plants and thus promote diversity.

How do you choose plants?

Downtown is a very busy place, so plants must be able to withstand repeated contact with pedestrians, drought, de-icing salt, wind, pollution, animal urine, and for trees, bike locks. They also have to thrive with little water and with their roots confined. You also need to pay attention to visibility at intersections, take into account the shade produced by buildings, highlight diversity to attract as many birds and pollinators as possible to the city...and inspire citizens.

What is your favourite park?

These days, it's Victor-T.-Daubigny Park, on Montcalm. Designed as permaculture to reduce the need for water and fertilizer while reusing our materials as much as possible (plants, wood chips, stones, etc.), it's a real mini forest in the city. The perfect place to cool off and watch birds and pollinators.

What is your favourite plant?

Ferns. They come in a multitude of textures and shades and give landscaping a natural look. My absolute favorite is *Adiantum pedatum*, very cold resistant.

Do you have any tips for fall?

Starting in mid-September, water conifers and evergreen shrubs abundantly before the winter to keep them from turning yellow, and, before the first frost, use dead leaves to cover and protect perennials that do not tolerate the cold easily, and the trunks of fragile bushes.

Why should you water plants after a storm?

To get the soil wet enough, you would need continuous, fairly intense rain for 6 to 12 hours. A heavy storm is not enough to water the plants: it simply moistens the soil on the surface, and most of the water runs off into the streets.

They passed the test!

Good news: the Ville-Marie parklets will remain accessible until the end of October. A great place to socialize and relax!

Les Faubourgs in motion

Redevelopment of the des Faubourgs sector continues! Following a historic agreement, the Ville de Montréal acquired some of the land of the Molson Coors brewery to create new living environments.

A large central park opposite the Saint Lawrence River, a riverside linear promenade, and a space that can host school or community groups are among the plans in the works. The Ville de Montréal will also acquire a site to build a mixed residential project run by the Société d'habitation et de développement de Montréal.

Municipal services for all

This summer, the Ville de Montréal adopted a **Policy for access to municipal services without fear**. Under this policy, all residents and their families, whatever their status, will be able to access municipal services such as libraries, sports facilities and day camps.

Concretely, the city will ease the rules and requirements regarding personal identification and residents for immigrants who cannot provide the usual supporting documents required. The most vulnerable people can have their identity and residence certified by one of the organizations recognized by the city. This service will be available starting September 23, 2019.

The Service de sécurité incendie de Montréal (SIM) recently amended by-law 12-003. All residential buildings built **before 1985** must now have a smoke alarm powered by a non-removable lithium battery with a lifespan of 10 years.

- Smoke detectors are **required**: all property owners must install the alarms in the locations stated in the bylaw.
- Tenants and landlords must regularly ensure that they work properly.
