Renovation of the drinking water treatment plant Work begins the week of March 1, 2021

Renovations to the drinking water treatment plant located on Avenue des Lilas will begin during the first week of March. Work will take place mainly inside the plant and will continue until the spring of 2023.

From the end of April to June, the installation of underground electrical conduits will require the excavation of a trench on the plant's property and in the parking lot of the J.J. Cardinal Funeral Home. Hydro-Québec will then come and connect the conduits to the electrical distribution network on Chemin du Bord-du-Lac.

The building of a small structure to protect the plant's water intake is also scheduled for August 2021, on the waterfront property (see map on back). Residents will receive further updates to inform them of the dates and duration of this portion of the work.

Nature of the work

The work aims to maintain equipment and partially renovate the plant. The goal is to ensure the reliability of the drinking water for Dorval residents and the Montréal-Trudeau International Airport.

Work schedule

Monday to Friday, from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Drinking water supply

- No interruption of the drinking water supply is planned.
- This work will have no impact on the quality of drinking water.

Impacts of the work

Parking

- During the installation of electrical cables outside the plant, the parking lot near the funeral home will not be accessible.
- Only construction or delivery trucks will have access to the plant's property. Site personnel vehicles must be parked on nearby streets.

Noise and dust

Noise and dust may be generated by the presence of trucks and work outside the plant.

How does the Dorval drinking water treatment plant operate?

The Dorval drinking water treatment plant has a production capacity of 68,000 m3/day, which is more than 18 Olympic-sized swimming pools. It treats the water drawn from Lac Saint-Louis to make it safe to drink.

After various treatments, the water is stored in the plant reservoirs and is then pumped into the water mains so it can flow to users under pressure. While the water is treated at the plant and throughout its journey through the distribution network to the user, it undergoes a series of very strict analyses and controls to guarantee its quality.
