MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR OF MONTRÉAL

To Ensure That Our Children Have Every Chance to Succeed

At this time of year, when many families are preparing for the start of another school year, it's a good time to talk about our children. Some weeks ago, I announced our brand new Policy on Children for Montréal in the presence of Pierrefonds-Roxboro borough Mayor, Mr. Dimitrios (Jim) Beis.

This policy is based on a simple, not to say obvious, principle: from birth to adulthood, each and every Montréal child must be able to grow, flourish and achieve their full potential.

It seems obvious, but for thousands of Montrealers living in low-income households, it's far from reality. Among children, poverty is often synonymous with food insecurity, development disorders and dropping out of school.

Our new Policy comes with an annual budget of \$5 M and the first measures will be deployed this fall in nine neighbourhoods, including the Cloverdale district in Pierrefonds-Roxboro. They are aimed at perseverance in school, healthy eating, and access to sports, recreation and cultural activities throughout the year.

Thanks to the support of partners such as the Breakfast Club of Canada - Quebec Region, the Fondation du Dr Julien, Sun Youth, the Société de transport de Montréal and several more, we will ensure that our children can develop both culturally and physically and have every chance of success. We will create a "child reflex" among all the players in municipal life.

This is the beginning of a strong social consortium, a unique strategy to assist our young people. Because investing time, resources and effort in our children is investing in our own future.

MESSAGE FROM THE BOROUGH MAYOR

A stimulating environment

The Child Policy will play a key role in the future of children of the Ville de Montréal. I am very pleased that in the Pierrefonds-Roxboro Borough we will be able to implement the initial measures of this policy for the children of our borough. The Child Policy establishes conditions to encourage the development and fulfillment of children. It is a pledge for the future!

With the approach of the school year, I ask motorists driving near schools to take a few extra minutes to get to their destination. Our borough has more than twenty primary and secondary schools. Every day, many children walk to get to school. The majority of the requests addressed to the Traffic and Road Safety Committee from citizens specifically concern the speed of motorists around schools and call for measures to compel drivers to slow down. Together we can make our borough safer, not only for our children but also for the citizens of Pierrefonds-Roxboro.

We continue to pursue the mission of the Strategic Plan 2015-2018, introduced on June 29, 2015. This mission encompasses urban heritage, sound management of sustainable development and optimization of borough resources, continuous improvement of services and quality of life for citizens. In terms of economic development, we are working to provide ourselves with the means to meet the demands of our corporate citizens and to promote the establishment of new businesses to better serve residents and create local jobs.

We also want to develop our neighborhoods to create even more space for outdoor games. We wish to offer a stimulating environment: meeting points for citizens of all ages, quality sports facilities and most definitely expansion of the bicycle path network. I am especially pleased with the work at Parkinson Park, a site where families will enjoy new trails, a court for tennis / pickleball (a happy blend of tennis and badminton), and a splash pad area that will certainly delight children. I am also very happy with the construction of a basketball court in Cloverdale, a project close to my heart. Youth will finally be able to play their favorite sport, safely and on a quality site.

In the coming months, I hope to galvanize the dynamism of the whole community, consolidating the sense of community in Pierrefonds-Roxboro. To highlight the cultural and environmental richness of Pierrefonds-Roxboro and to showcase the significant sites in our borough, this is the undertaking that I propose during the celebrations of Montréal's 375th anniversary.

I thank the residents who beautify our borough with their flower beds, a prime example of the pride of the citizens of Pierrefonds-Roxboro. Above all, do not hesitate to share your suggestions if you see me on your street during one of my daily rounds.

WALKING SAFELY!

On the Island of Montréal, 50% of all deaths due to road accidents involve pedestrians of all ages, meaning over 1,300 pedestrians are hit by a vehicle. To reduce the number of casualties, we ask that all road users - specifically motorists and pedestrians, better cooperate in sharing the road.

MOTORISTS: BE ALERT AT CROSSWALKS!



When the roadway is marked with symbols and signs indicating a pedestrian crossing, the driver must show caution and yield the road to pedestrians needing to cross. As well, when a pedestrian walks through a pedestrian crosswalk, the driver of a road vehicle must stop and allow him/her to cross.

PEDESTRIANS: THREE RULES TO SAFELY CROSS INTERSECTIONS WHERE THERE ARE PEDESTRIAN TRAFFIC LIGHTS.



Use the push button to call the pedestrian phase

The push button modifies the traffic light cycles by extending the time allocated for crossing. When the push button is activated, the crossing time lasts 24 seconds (white silhouette: 10 seconds, countdown timer: 14 seconds). If the button is not pushed, no time is allocated for crossing.



Cross when the white silhouette appears

The white silhouette authorizes pedestrians to cross the street carefully, after having check left and right.



The countdown timer indicates the time pedestrians have left to cross.



Do not cross on an orange hand

If the silhouette of the hand is flashing, do not attempt to cross. If you have already started to cross, you should hurry up.

Where there are only traffic lights, pedestrians have the right of way on the green light only.

NEW!

CODERED AUTOMATED CALL SYSTEM FOR EMERGENCIES



Like many cities in the province of Québec, the borough of Pierrefonds-Roxboro is now equipped with an automated call system that will quickly and effectively reach citizens in case of an emergency (for example: advisories to boil or do not use water, water main breaks, street closures).

We will be able to reach you quickly either by landline telephone, cellular phone, text messages or emails, but only if you record the information required to reach you in the database. For now, only the phone numbers listed in the white pages of the directory are recorded.

We encourage you to go promptly to the Borough's website to enter the number or numbers and email addresses to receive these notices in case of emergency. Click the CodeRed button to fill out the form.







Access to activities



GREEN WASTE COLLECTION



The green waste and dead leaf collection will take place every **Wednesday**, from May 4 to November 23 in the sectors located East of Yuile Park and West of boulevard des Sources, where the organic waste collection has not yet been implemented.

Residents of the sectors where the organic waste collection is in place must place their green waste in the brown bin designated for this collection on the collection day in their sector. Green waste surplus and dead leaves may be deposited outside the brown bin providing they are placed in a proper container.

Accepted Containers

The only containers accepted are paper bags, unwaxed cardboard (kraft) boxes and other rigid reusable containers. **Plastic bags are not allowed for the green waste collection neither for the organic waste collection, either inside or outside the brown bin.**

Accepted waste

Horticultural waste, leaves, grass and remnants from domestic gardening.

Evergreen Small Branches

Small branches of **evergreens** (cedar, fir, pine, spruce, etc.), **no more than 1 meter long and 5 centimetres in diameter, tied in bundles are accepted in the green waste collection on the dates indicated in the calendar. Outside of this period, these branches will be allowed in the garbage collection.**

Refused waste

Food leftovers (allowed only in the brown bin), earth, stones, litter and feces, as well as **evergreen branches longer than 1 meter or whose diameter exceeds 5 cm or branches of deciduous trees** (maple, ash, oak, poplar, etc.). For more information, please see page 24.

NOTES

Recyclables

Dates in this table apply to residential sectors and schools. There is no collection of recyclables in businesses and industries.

Garbage

For buildings of 9 units or more, schools and businesses, the collection is carried out twice a week, on Monday and Thursday.

Organic Waste

The collection takes place in the sectors where the first phase has been implemented last spring.

Hours

Containers must be placed at the curb, after 8 p.m. the night before and no later than 7 a.m. the day of pick-up.

COLLECTIONS

BRANCH COLLECTION AS PART OF THE EMERALD ASH BORER CONTROL PLAN

Please do not put branches of deciduous trees (maple, ash, oak, poplar, etc.) and evergreen branches whose length exceeds 1 meter or diameter exceeds 5 cm in the green waste, organic waste or garbage containers. These branches will be picked up separately.

Garden maintenance done by the citizen

The borough offers a free collection service of branches resulting from regular garden maintenance done by the citizen. In this case, branches must be placed with the larger ends toward the street and the leaves toward the property.

No need to call 311.

Borough teams drive around the whole territory to carry out a systematic collection.

Delay

Depending on weather conditions, a period of six weeks is to be expected once the branches are placed along the street.

Deadline

Friday, October 28, 2016

ATTENTION:

TREE FELLING AND MAINTENANCE PERFORMED BY A CONTRACTOR

The contractor is responsible for the management of branches and trunks of trees he fells or maintains.

CONSTRUCTION AND RENOVATION SCRAP MATERIALS

If you wish to dispose of such materials (restricted to wood, plaster, rubble, stone, concrete, asphalt shingles and metal):

- call the Citizen's Office at 311;
- a borough representative will visit you and provide a cost estimate for the pick-up;
- pay the amount of the estimate at the Borough Hall (\$30 service charge and a fee of \$53 per square metre).

Refuse must be placed on the pavement in front of your property on a surface that does not exceed one metre deep nor block a catch basin. The deadline for pick-ups of scrap materials is the last Friday in October. This service is not available during the winter months.

RECYCLING BINS

New property

A new resident of a newly constructed single-family home or of a building of 8 apartments or less can obtain, free of charge, a recycling bin in the period of one year following his or her move. To obtain a recycle bin, please call 311.

Moving

The recycling bin is owned by the Ville de Montréal. If you move, the recycling container must stay at its original address.

NOTE: Every recycling bin's serial number is registered and is attached to a specific address.

RECYCLABLES: HOW TO POSITION THE RECYCLABLE MATERIALS BIN FOR COLLECTION?

Recyclable bin collection is mechanized and, therefore, the following instructions should be respected:



- place all accepted recyclable materials loose in the bin. Help us keep the streets clean on collection day, make sure the container lid is closed and that it does not overflow;
- place the bin at the curb the evening before collection after 8 p.m. or on collection day before 7 a.m.;
- the bin should be placed on your property, wheels and handle on the side of your house. Never place the bin on the sidewalk or street;
- place the bin at 15-30 cm (6-12 inches) from the curb or sidewalk;
- leave a clearance of at least 1 m (3 ft) around the container;
- the recycling bin should be easily visible and accessible to the operator at all times.

MISPLACED BINS WILL NOT BE EMPTIED.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE (HHW) COLLECTION

Ville de Montréal EcoCentres allow you to dispose of your household hazardous waste any time free of charge. GARAGE SALES: OBTAINING A PERMIT IS REQUIRED IN ROXBORO AS WELL AS IN PIERREFONDS!

Only objects that have been used or were acquired to be used for domestic purposes by the occupants of the home or building can be sold during a garage sale after obtaining the proper permit.

The obligation to obtain this permit applies in Roxboro as in Pierrefonds.

Garage sale permits are valid for two consecutive days. No more than two permits can be issued per calendar year for the same address. Sales can take place only between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Permits can be obtained, free of charge, by filling out an application form at the Citizen's Office at the Borough Hall, 13665, boulevard de Pierrefonds.

RULES FOR POSTING SIGNS

- Four signs will be handed out to the applicant;
- Only these signs are allowed for use;
- Signs must be removed in the 24 hours following the garage sale.

Permit holders must respect traffic by-laws, particularly those relating to street parking, and must also follow the borough's instructions on posting garage sale signs. Anyone contravening the provisions of by-law no CA29 0082 is liable to a fine.

TREE TOPPING AND SEVERING IS PROHIBITED



Municipal by-law CA29 0040 contains provisions to protect trees against practices that affect their survival. Accordingly, this regulation prohibits the severe pruning of the crowns of trees and the

removal of an important part of the roots. Therefore, the removal of more than 50% of the crown or of the roots is considered as an illegal logging and is liable to a \$500 fine to which an amount of \$100 may be added for each tree logged.

REMINDER

Tree topping consists of pruning all branches of a tree at the same height, often near the trunk, in order to limit the growth of a tree already considered too large. This practice is known to be the most damaging since it increases the risk of breakage (development of cavities, decay) and it results in trees becoming more dangerous than they were previously. Topping is not a solution to reduce the size of your trees. Other better suited practices exist. Entrust the work to a qualified arborist, member of a professional organization such as the International Society of Arboriculture of Quebec: siaq.org

BY-LAW TO FIGHT THE SPREAD OF THE EMERALD ASH BORER: RULES FOR TRANSPORTING AND DISPOSING OF ASH WOOD

The transportation of ash wood through human activity is the biggest cause of the emerald ash borer's spread in North America. The emerald ash borer can emerge from cut logs and branches up to three years after a tree is felled! So it is important to know when ash wood can be transported and how to dispose of it to prevent the propagation of ash borer.

If you have only a few branches with a diameter of less than 20 cm, you can place them on the curb and call 311 to have the borough pick them up. Please note that this service is offered up to Friday, October 28, inclusive (see page 24 for details).

BETWEEN APRIL 15 AND SEPTEMBER 15

- You **must not move** your ash wood from the site of pruning or felling, unless it has been shredded to destroy the ash borer.
- Your ash wood can be stored on-site until it can be moved to a transformation-site **beginning September 15**.
- Beginning September 15, you have **21 days** to shred your ash wood on-site or take it to an institution or organization that can transform it appropriately to prevent propagation of the ash borer.
- If you are the owner of a woodland with 25 or more ash trees that measure 1.4 m or higher from the ground and have a diameter of 15 cm or more, you have **60 days** beginning September 15 to transform your ash wood on-site or take it to an institution or organization that

can transform it appropriately to prevent propagation of the ash borer.

BETWEEN SEPTEMBER 15 AND APRIL 15

- You **may move** your ash wood, transformed or not, from the site of pruning or felling.
- You have **21 days** following the felling or the trimming to shred your ash wood on-site or take it to an institution or organization that can transform it appropriately to prevent propagation of the ash borer.
- If you are the owner of a woodland with 25 or more ash trees that measure 1.4 m or higher from the ground and have a diameter of 15 cm or more, you have **60 days** from the felling or trimming of these ash trees to transform the ash wood on-site or take it to an institution or organization that can transform it appropriately to prevent propagation of the ash borer.

TRANSFORMATION TECHNIQUES THAT ARE COMPLIANT WITH THE BY-LAW

Any ash wood transformation technique that completely destroys the ash borer or the parts of wood in which the insect can hide: shredding into chips no longer than 2.5 cm on at least two sides, drying, grinding, fumigation or sawmilling that includes shredding of the parts with bark.

BY-LAWS

TREE FELLING

A certificate of authorization is required for felling a tree when the trunk of the tree has a diameter of at least 10 cm at 1.3 m from the ground or a diameter of at least 15 cm at a maximum of 15 cm from the ground. This certificate is issued in any of the following situations:

- the tree is dead or in a state of irreversible decline.
- The tree must, upon recommendation of a tree expert, be felled due to an irreversible situation caused by a disease, a structural deficiency affecting its strength or serious damage that it causes to a property.
- The tree is located in the area of a proposed construction or more than 3 m of it unless there is a sign, an accessory building or a proposed retaining wall. However, a tree located between 3 m and 5 m from the area of the proposed construction may be felled if replaced.
- The tree is located in the area of implementation of a swimming pool or in the front yard, in the area of implementation of a parking lot or a driveway to a building, only if no space is available for such arrangements elsewhere on the ground.
- The tree must be felled because of the risk of spreading disease or invasive alien species. In this case, it must be replaced.
- The tree must be cut down in order to develop, in the shore of a body of water, a 5-metre-wide opening giving access to it, when the slope of this shore is less than 30%.

IMPORTANT

During excavation, construction and landscaping work, neighbouring trees must be protected. When necessary, the cutting down of trees should be limited to the perimeter of the main construction, including a band with a maximum depth of 3 m excluding accessory buildings.

BY-LAW CONCERNING SOLID-FUEL-BURNING STOVES AND FIREPLACES

In 2015, Montréal adopted the **By-law concerning solid-fuel-burning stoves and fireplaces**. This by-law applies in all 19 boroughs and consists of:

- Prohibiting the use of solid-fuel-burning devices during smog warnings, effective immediately.
- As of October 1, 2018, prohibiting the use of solid-fuel-burning devices, unless they are recognized by the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) as emitting no more than 2.5 g/hr of fine particles into the atmosphere.
- Authorizing the use of all solid-fuel-burning devices, whether they are in conformity or not, during electricity outages that last more than three hours.


WHAT IS A SOLID-FUEL-BURNING DEVICE?

Solid-fuel-burning devices include stoves, furnaces, heaters, and prefabricated or conventional fireplaces, designed to burn wood logs or other solid materials such as ecological logs, pellets or coal. Gas and electric fireplaces are not solid-fuel-burning devices.

CHIMNEY SWEEPING

Chimney sweeping and the cost incurred are the homeowner's responsibility. To prevent fires, have your chimneys inspected and cleaned at least once a year.

Always call upon a professional chimney sweeper. For your own protection as well as his, insist on seeing his or her Professional Qualification Certificate and proof of insurance.

WHY HIRE AN ARBORIST?

Like all maintenance works around the house, tree maintenance is required to preserve their health and strength.

Tree care can be dangerous work, whether for the safety of people or for the tree's health. Therefore, it is advised to hire a qualified arborist. However, how can you tell if an arborist is qualified?

First, the arborist must be knowledgeable about the needs of trees and trained to provide proper care. Poorly maintained trees can become dangerous. A good arborist will determine the type of pruning necessary to maintain or improve the health, appearance and safety of trees. Furthermore, he will be able to correct or secure the structure of a tree to reduce the likelihood of future damage during storm events. He will recommend tree removal as a last resort only.

Québec's International Society of arboriculture (SIAQ) suggests some criteria to consider when choosing an arborist:

- Check for membership in professional organizations.
- Ask for a proof of insurance for personal and property damage as well as insurance for workers (CNESST). Otherwise, you could be liable for damage or injuries that occur during the work.
- Ask for references and consult the SIAQ website to know more about arborists' reputation.
- Be aware of individuals who go door-to-door and offer bargains or work without bills.
- Get a written quote that includes the description of the work to be done, wood management and cleanup of the site.
- Get more than one estimate to compare quality/price rate.

MANAGING GREEN SPACES ECOLOGICALLY

Rooting out myths about urban trees

Do you think that the tree in front of your property is so large that its roots could actually eat into and block your drain pipes? Do you think that its root system could crack your foundations? Here are good examples of well rooted myths. Read on and you can be the one to reassure your most sceptical neighbours.

Although roots may be found in the cracks of a drain pipe or foundation, they are not to blame. Ageing infrastructures with their limited service life can cause cracks to appear as a result of soil contraction or expansion. Technical defects may then accelerate ageing and cause even more damage. Roots develop in cracks where they can find the nutrients to develop. Roots are not strong enough to cause cracks in concrete, or make them larger. They simply make use of the space available, which increases over time. Roots that grow in drain pipes or foundations are a sign that maintenance or repair is required. Trees are not to blame.
