

ACCEPTED MATERIALS

- Refrigeration, freezing and air conditioning units containing halocarbons (refrigerant gases)
- Household appliances
- Electronic products (e.g. computers, cellphones, printers, audio systems, televisions, DVD or VHS players, etc.)
- Articles to be reused
- Large upholstered furniture (e.g. sofas, armchairs, mattresses, etc.)
- Paper, cardboard, glass containers, plastic containers and metal containers
- Ferrous and non-ferrous metals
- Used bicycle tires, car tires and inner tubes (84 cm or less)
- Construction, renovation and demolition waste (e.g., wood; gypsum; asphalt shingles; aggregates of less than 60 cm in diameter made of brick, mortar or stone, asphalt or concrete waste; uncontaminated soil, etc.)
- Household hazardous waste (HHW) (e.g. paint, oil, solvent, pesticide, chlorine, etc.)
- Green waste, dead leaves and conifers (directives may vary according to the season*)
- * Deciduous tree branches, stumps and trunks are not accepted to avoid spreading the emerald ash borer.

DONATION CONTAINER

Every ecocentres has a donation container where you can deposit clothing, linen and household accessories (i.e. bed sheets, towels, table cloths, kitchen linen, etc.)

BEFORE THROWING AWAY, THINK ABOUT REUSE!

Furniture, household items, books, toys, sports items and other objects that are still useable may be left at one of the ecocentre reuse centres (same opening hours as the ecocentres). These donations are sent to organizations or businesses that work in the field.

Did you know that at the LaSalle and Saint-Laurent ecocentres, you can purchase used doors, windows, bathtubs, wash basins, sinks, ceramic tile and other items?

RECYCLING CENTRES exclusively for Montreal Island residents

Ecocentres are waste re-used and recovery sites that are accessible to all residents of the Montréal agglomeration. Among the materials that are accepted at ecocentres are the following: construction/renovation debris, dangerous household waste and reusable materials. Ecocentres keep a great deal of waste from having to be sent to landfills.

PROPER SORTING FOR BETTER RECYCLING!

Sorting beforehand greatly facilitates and shortens your visit at the ecocentre.

Sorted materials are more easily transferred to specialized recyclers.

The agglomeration and its residents can significantly reduce landfill costs.

For your safety at the ecocentre, you should wear closed shoes, safety goggles and gloves when dropping off items.





ACCESS AND FEES

Agglomeration residents

• Go to the ecocentre in person with proof that you live on the island of Montréal and a photo ID.

- Building materials:
- >12 cubic metres or less: free
- > More than 12 cubic metres: \$25/cubic metre
- > No minimum (however, our records will indicate at least 1 cubic metre per visit)
- > Maximum of 15 visits per year, except for LaSalle and Saint-Laurent ecocentres, where visits are unlimited.
- Other materials free of charge. Certain limits may apply.

Contractors and self-employed construction workers

- Provide proof that the company is located on the island of Montreal (or be accompanied by a resident of the agglomeration at whose home the work took place).
- Building materials:
- > \$25/cubic metre
- > No minimum (however, our records will indicate at least 1 cubic metre per visit)
- > Maximum of 15 visits per year, except for LaSalle and Saint-Laurent ecocentres, where visits are unlimited.
- Metal, green waste and electronic products are free of charge. Certain limits may apply.
- Other excluded materials

Accepted vehicle length varies from one ecocentre to another. It is preferable to check ahead of time by phone or online before visiting.
