SAINT-LAURENT'S BIODIVERSITY CORRIDOR: RECONNECTING THE HUMAN BEING WITH NATURE!

On International Day for Biological Diversity, Saint-Laurent unveiled the main features of its biodiversity corridor at a press conference held on May 22 in front of the Borough's Municipal Workshops. Situated in the heart of this ambitious project, this location will be the site of the first work operations this year. The corridor will eventually cover approximately 450 hectares, including industrial, commercial and residential sectors.

The innovative vision that has inspired it was developed in a master plan devised by the winning team of the national multidisciplinary landscape architecture competition in 2018—a team composed of the following firms: Biodiversité Conseil, civiliti, LAND Italia and Table Architecture. This plan was prepared in collaboration with the Borough's Division de l'environnement et de la protection du territoire and is available on the Borough's website in the Business and economy / Urban Planning / Urban Projects section.

THE ORGANIC WASTE PATROL IS ON THE ROAD!

Since late April, the organic waste patrol began to tour buildings with 8 or fewer housing units to increase the residents' awareness of the importance of participating in household organic waste collection. The management and coordination of this team comprising two patrol officers is being overseen by the Saint-Laurent organization VertCit .

The organic waste patrol's door-to-door campaign will continue until the end of November. A door hanger listing practical tips on how to improve participation in the collection will be distributed to the homes concerned. Awareness officers will also be on hand at outdoor events in the parks throughout the summer.

Objective

According to the 2016 portrait of waste materials within the Montr al Urban Agglomeration, the organic waste recovery rate in the Borough of Saint-Laurent was 26%, which is 6% higher than the average for Montr al as a whole, placing it in fourth position among the leading boroughs.

It should be recalled that the recovery objective of the Qu bec Residual Materials Management Policy is 60% by 2020. Achieving this goal will help in the battle against climate change by reducing the quantity of waste materials sent to landfill sites and by lowering greenhouse gas emissions.

SUCCESSFUL CONSULTATIONS ON THE BOIS-FRANC TRAIN STATION SECTOR

On May 16, 53 participants took part in the second phase of the consultation exercise conducted as part of the urban planning process under way for the Bois-Franc train station sector.

The purpose of this urban planning ideation session was to move forward in identifying planning issues and to propose concrete solutions in the form of local community actions and development scenarios. The group was composed of residents, representatives of community organizations, students, professionals and partners from the public and private sectors.

As it may be recalled, the first ideation session was held during a public consultation that took place last April 30, in which 86 residents participated. The detailed results of the consultation and ideation sessions will be published in a report to be prepared by the Provencher_Roy consulting firm this summer. The final planning report is expected to be submitted by the end of the year.

COMMUNAUTO FLEX SERVICE LAUNCHED IN SAINT-LAURENT



The Communauto FLEX service was launched on Saint-Laurent territory in the presence of **Marco Viviani**, Vice-President - Strategic Development at Communauto, **Aref Salem**, City Councillor for Norman-McLaren District, accompanied by his daughters, **Tara** and **Joya**, **Alan DeSousa**, Mayor of Saint-Laurent, **Francesco Miele**, City Councillor for Côte-de-Liesse District, and **Jacques Cohen**, Borough Councillor for Côte-de-Liesse District.

On June 7, the Communauto company launched its self-serve Communauto FLEX carsharing service in Saint-Laurent. The service operates without reservations and provides immediate, 24/7 access to hybrid and electric vehicles. Its users take a car to any destination they choose and drop it off anywhere they want within the service area. Rental can be arranged for a few minutes, hours or days.

“We are very pleased to welcome this new service, which will diversify accessible means of transportation for our community. Users will now be able to get around more quickly in Saint-Laurent and easily access other Montréal boroughs. Our collaboration with Communauto, which began in 2005 through its reservation-based rental service, is in line with Saint-Laurent’s policy to promote active, ecological and sustainable modes of transportation. These are alternatives to single-occupancy vehicle use, just like the BIXI bikes recently rolled out in Saint-Laurent. The implementation of these vehicles is also in keeping with the guidelines of our Local Transportation Plan adopted in 2017 and

our status as a sustainable municipal territory,” mentioned the Mayor of Saint-Laurent, Alan DeSousa.

Where to park these vehicles in Saint-Laurent?

On Saint-Laurent territory, Communauto FLEX vehicles will be allowed to park only in the two SRRR (on-street parking reserved for residents) zones, namely:

- The SRRR in Vieux-Saint-Laurent, bounded by Boulevard Marcel-Laurin and Boulevard de la Côte-Vertu, Avenue Sainte-Croix and Rue Saint-Louis
- The SRRR at Montpellier commuter train station, bounded by Boulevard de la Côte-Vertu, Avenue Sainte-Croix, Rue Tassé and Rue Muir

DON'T LET YOUR ASH TREES DOWN



Get free emerald ash borer treatment!

Great news for ash tree owners! The treatment of ash trees in landscaped yards, specifically meaning in private landscaped yards excluding woodlands, is now free of charge. The Ville de Montréal will cover 100% of the treatment cost for your trees.

To benefit from this free treatment, simply consent online before July 31 at ville.montreal.qc.ca/ashborer or complete the form available at the Citizens' Office.

Please note that only healthy ash trees can be treated. Dead ash trees where more than 30% of the treetop is dead must be felled immediately. If this situation applies to you, please call 311 to arrange a tree-cutting permit. By acting quickly, you will limit the cost and prevent injuries. Furthermore, a fully dead ash tree may be more expensive to cut down. A financial assistant program is available to help cover the costs of tree cutting. PREVENTIVE CHIMNEY SWEEPING

Saint-Laurent wishes to remind its citizens that the municipal bylaw on fire prevention stipulates that all chimneys, with the exception of those connected to gas heating systems, must be swept at least once a year.

Citizens may call the company of their choice or contact the trusted firm mandated by the Borough. For 2019, Saint-Laurent has mandated **Le meilleur ramoneur** to carry out preventive chimney sweeping services on its territory. Priced at \$23.50 plus taxes, this chimney-sweeping operation is a basic service and does not include the maintenance of furnaces and the cleaning of horizontal ducts, which, under certain circumstances, must be insured by the owner. The price may vary depending on the chimney type and size.

CORRIDOR DE BIODIVERSITÉ DE SAINT-LAURENT : RECONNECTER L'HUMAIN À LA NATURE!

« Ce projet de long terme, qui engage Saint-Laurent sur plus de 20 ans, est unique en son genre et totalement révolutionnaire, a déclaré Alan DeSousa, maire de Saint-Laurent. Le défi est de taille puisque notre territoire comprend la plus grande zone industrielle du Québec et est constitué à 82 % d'éléments bâtis ou minéralisés propices aux îlots de chaleur. Plus généralement, les phénomènes de changements climatiques nous commandent d'agir rapidement avec des solutions innovantes. Le corridor de Saint-Laurent servira donc de laboratoire pour Montréal, le Québec, le Canada et – osons le dire – le monde entier! En effet, c'est le premier projet du genre en milieu urbain. Il offrira aux citoyens et aux travailleurs de Saint-Laurent un milieu de vie d'une grande qualité et deviendra pour eux un espace privilégié de découvertes, de contacts avec la nature, et ce, en plein cœur d'un milieu urbain en effervescence. C'est cela le corridor de biodiversité de Saint-Laurent : concilier le développement urbain et le développement durable, la logique de ville et la logique de vie! »

De son côté, Fannie Duguay-Lefebvre, porte-parole de l'équipe lauréate du concours 2018, a précisé : « Avec notre équipe pluridisciplinaire, nous proposons une série d'aménagements ramenant la vie dans tous ses états. Par exemple, à l'extrémité nord du corridor, au bout du boulevard Thimens, nous suggérons l'aménagement d'un passage supérieur multiusage au-dessus du chemin de fer. Nous imaginons également un passage faunique souterrain entre les boisés du parc Marcel-Laurin et de Cavendish-Raymond-Lasnier-Beaulac-Poirier. La colonne vertébrale du corridor de biodiversité consistera à végétaliser des terre-pleins en friche sous les lignes aériennes de transport d'électricité le long des boulevards Cavendish, Poirier et Thimens. Tous les aménagements envisagés constitueront surtout autant de nouveaux habitats favorables à l'accueil d'espèces végétales diversifiées, d'oiseaux et d'insectes. »

"This long-term project, which will involve a commitment on the part of Saint-Laurent for more than 20 years, is unique and totally revolutionary, explained the Mayor of Saint-Laurent, Alan DeSousa. The challenge is substantial, as our territory has the largest industrial area in Québec and 82% of its territory is made up of built structures or paved surfaces that are prone to the creation of heat islands. More generally, climate change issues are requiring us to act quickly with innovative solutions. The Saint-Laurent corridor will therefore serve as a laboratory for Montréal, for the province of Québec, for all of Canada and—dare we say—for the entire world! In fact, it is the first project of its kind in an urban environment. This project will provide Saint-Laurent residents and workers with a high-quality living environment. For them, it will become a privileged space for discovery and contact with nature, right in the heart of a bustling urban environment. That is what Saint-Laurent's biodiversity corridor is all about: reconciling urban development and sustainable development, the logic of the city and the logic of life!"

Fannie Duguay-Lefebvre, the spokesperson for the 2018 winning contest team explained: "With our multidisciplinary team, we are proposing a series of developments that will bring back life in all its forms. For example, at the northernmost part of the corridor, at the end of Boulevard Thimens, we are suggesting the development of a multi-use overpass across the railway. We also imagine an underground wildlife passageway between the woodlands of Parc Marcel-Laurin and those of Cavendish-Raymond-Lasnier-Beaulac-Poirier. The backbone of the biodiversity corridor will consist of revegetating wasteland under the overhead power lines along Cavendish, Poirier and Thimens boulevards. All the developments planned will, first and foremost, serve as new habitats conducive to attracting diversified plant species, birds and insects."

2018 IN ACHIEVEMENTS

CONTEXT

The Ville de Montréal Charter stipulates that at a regular Council meeting held in June, the Borough Mayor must present to the citizens the highlights of the Borough's financial report and, if applicable, those of the General Auditor's report and those of the external auditor's report if items relating to the Borough are mentioned.

This report is distributed across Saint-Laurent territory according to the distribution terms determined by the Borough.



In accordance with the law, I am hereby tabling the *Highlights of Saint-Laurent's 2018 Financial Report*.

The year 2018 was marked by the celebration of the 125th Anniversary of Saint-Laurent's incorporation, by the consolidation of our vision expressed in the sectorial plans adopted in 2017 and by the planning of major projects in progress, such as the biodiversity corridor.

Municipal affairs and the economy

- The celebration of Saint-Laurent's 125th Anniversary of Incorporation with a series of activities launched on February 27. The program included, among other things, an open house at Borough Hall and the *Grandir par la musique* (Growing up with music) concert presented at Salle Émile-Legault in collaboration with the Commission scolaire Marguerite-Bourgeoys.
- In October, the adoption of a bylaw prohibiting the consumption or use of cannabis or of any derivative product on public property in Saint-Laurent.
- In November, the update of the Saint-Laurent mobile app allowing users to discover key attractions on a redesigned interface with a streamlined design and innovative features.
- Support for the restoration of Maison Robert-Bélanger through a \$1.2 million contribution from the Ville de Montréal's Three-Year Capital Works Program and \$1.2 million from the Québec Cultural Heritage Fund.
- The receipt of a second certification as a Municipalité amie des enfants (Child-Friendly Municipality), awarded by the Carrefour action municipale et famille for the 2017-2019 period.

- The receipt of the Prix d'excellence 2018 from the Association québécoise du loisir municipal in the category for Municipalities or boroughs with 75,000 or more residents for the Sports Complex, and of two awards for the Défi santé.

Environment and sustainable development

- The spring presentation by the finalists and the announcement of the winner of the multidisciplinary landscape architecture contest for the development of a master design plan for the Cavendish-Laurin-Liesse biodiversity corridor.
- In March, the renewal of the subsidy programs for the purchase or rental of washable diapers, managed by VertCité.
- In May, the launch of a subsidy program for the purchase of environmentally friendly lawnmowers.
- In December, the amendment of the large trash item collection process to increase repurposing. Two different teams are now mandated to collect solid materials and upholstered items respectively.
- Development of the Nordet and Rambler squares to provide Bois-Franc families with two new green islands.



- Participation in the BIXI electric pilot project featuring a new technology developed by the Québec-based firm PBSC Solutions urbaines, and the announced expansion of the BIXI network on the territory in 2019.
- The receipt of Stationnement écoresponsable 2018 certification awarded by the Conseil régional de l'environnement de Montréal for the development of the Ouimet Sud parking facility.

■ Recreation and social development

- The opening of three new universally accessible community gardens, each with 24 raised gardening plots, some of which are adapted for persons with reduced mobility.
- In June, the opening of the new soccer field in Parc Philippe-Laheurte, which brings the total number in Saint-Laurent to 24.
- In July, the unveiling on the Parc Poirier chalet of a mural entitled "Nature spontanée" ("Spontaneous nature") produced by Zek One, an artist from the Ashop creative studio.
- In September, the launch of the Decelles urban promenade along with the unveiling of a temporary structure designed and produced by the Pépinière/Espaces collectifs NGO and the Castor et Pollux agency, in collaboration with Saint-Laurent and Vanier College.
- In September, the hosting of the first edition of the Terry Fox Run at the Suroît basin chalet in Parc Bois-Franc. The participants helped to raise \$1560 for cancer research.
- In September, the celebration of the 5th Anniversary of the Bibliothèque du Boisé with an event attended by some 3000 participants.
- In September, the hosting of the Montréal Impact at the Sports Complex and at Parc Marcel-Laurin during the only Montréal stop for the 2018 BMO Soccer Celebration Tour. This event attracted more than 1000 fans who came out to mingle with 11 professional players.
- In the fall, the exhibition of some forty Chinese lanterns created by the Chinese artist Gu Yeliang in front of the Bibliothèque du Boisé.

2018 IN NUMBERS

- 74,902 requests processed by the Citizens' Office.
- 8384 interventions by the Urban Security Patrol.
- 1560 housing units approved by the Advisory Committee on Planning, including 1483 contending for LEED certification.
- A total of \$260,238,010 in building permit value, including \$120,961,082 in the residential sector.
- \$5.2 million invested in the repair of roads, sidewalks and curbs by the City and the Borough.
- \$1.04 billion invested in Saint-Laurent by companies in the industrial and tertiary-motor sectors.
- 138 new businesses established in Saint-Laurent.
- 977 new trees planted, including 30 under the One child, one tree program.
- 847 trees treated for the emerald ash borer.
- 6842 tons of recyclable materials and 4061 tons of organic waste collected from citizens.
- 972 litres of waste, 810 litres of recyclable materials and 48 litres of organic waste collected during the cleaning blitz in the Parc Marcel-Laurin woodlands.
- 0.4 km of new bicycle paths.
- 768,673 loans and renewals and 7313 new members at the two libraries.
- 15,615 spectators for the cultural program.
- 7098 visitors at the Centre d'exposition Lethbridge.
- 17,548 participations in Spring Break Passport activities, representing a significant increase with the opening of the Sports Complex and the creation of a Youth Passport.

2018 FINANCIAL RESULTS

Let's take a look at the key financial data for last year. Accordingly, the total budget for fiscal 2018 was \$5,270,700 for income and \$70,320,800 for expenses. This corresponds to a budgetary envelope from the City totalling \$52,259,100 in addition to tax room and local tax of \$12,791,000.

Our strict management and the exemplary planning of our expenses and income have generated a \$3,121,700 operating surplus before central adjustments.

The following table indicates, for each activity, the variations between the amended original budget and the actual results for 2018.
